NARRATIVE 1	

Ramp entirely unlit. Multiple RON aircraft, with no reflective cones. During taxi out, came face to face with 5 head on aircraft. 2nd to last aircraft, had to stop to avoid loss of wing tip separation. "Spots" are very difficult to see at night. Even with GPS on iPad, hard to keep track of where you are. Separation between blue and orange lines is minimal.

## **SYNOPSIS**

Air carrier Captain reported difficulty seeing the spot locations at CLT due to a lack of lighting at night and expressed concern about minimal clearance between aircraft on designated taxi lines.
