On taxi in through the ramp we were almost hit by a tug carrying a baggage cart. It was on the orange line driving eastbound toward 13S. The tug driver did not give way forcing us to apply brakes and they swerved left leaving the marked road to avoid collision.

The ground drivers need training. The ramp could use more lighting. It happened at night.

SYNOPSIS

Air carrier pilot monitoring reported taxiing in through the ramp at night and almost colliding with a tug carrying baggage when the tug driver did not give way to the aircraft. Reporter stated that inadequate lighting was a factor.
